Effective Use

- Accomplishes your immediate goal
 - Quickly and efficiently
- Readies you for any next important steps
- Can be multiple independent processes, but they can often be easily combined to save time.

What do we mean by ‘effective use’?



With Writing Software...

- Complements your preferences to aid you in finishing your manuscript.
- Easy to convert into publishable format.
 - Spacing
 - Page breaks
 - Chapter headings
 - Punctuation

Anything that gets your vision onto the page

- Analogue
 - Pen and paper
- Electronic
 - Computer
 - Numerous Software
- Voice
 - Dictation Software
- Thought
 - Not yet! (but soon?)

Plotting / StoryBoarding Tools

Plottr (Paid)

- Very popular, wide range of formats
- Wide range of features
- Local to computer

PowerPoint (Paid)

- Popular, wide range of formats
- In cloud, great for collaborations
- Slows down on large files

Scrivener (Paid)

- Designed for Authors
- Easy to move scenes around
- Easily keep all related info in one file
- Less intuitive to use

Canva (Free/Paid)

- Templates available

Milanote (Free/Paid)

- Storyboarding, plotting, character info
- Weekly planner, etc

Any graphics program

- e.g. Gimp (time consuming)

Post-It Notes

- Low energy
- Require a large space to use

Common Writing Tools

Microsoft Word (Paid)

- Very popular, wide range of formats
- Wide range of features
- Most common writing program

Scrivener (Paid)

- Designed for Authors
- Easy to move scenes around
- Easily keep all related info in one file
- Less intuitive to use

Open Office / LibreOffice (Free)

- Compatible with Word and other formats
- *almost* as good as Microsoft Office

Google Docs (Free)

- Popular, wide range of formats
- In cloud, great for collaborations
- Slows down on large files

Celtx (Paid)

- Script-writing and collaboration
- Online
- Only for scriptwriters

Others

- Notepad (free, basic)
- Reedsy (free + formatting)
- Campfire Blaze /Word Anvil

Dictation Tools

Dragon (Paid)

- The best, but expensive

Word (Paid)

- Included in Word
- Seems to work quite well

Google Docs (Free)

- Depends on your internet / computer speed
- Not the best results (personal trial)

LilySpeech - OpenOffice Add-on (Free)

- Uses Google transcription technology

Descript (Free/Paid)

- Online *transcription* from recording
- 1hr / month free

Otter.ai (Free/Paid)

- Online *transcription* from recording
- 10 x 30 min / month free

Editing Tools

ProWriting Aid (Free/Paid)

- Very popular, wide range of formats
- Wide range of features
- Local to computer

Grammerly (Free/Paid)

- Designed for Authors
- Easy to move scenes around
- Easily keep all related info in one file
- Less intuitive to use

Readily available options

1. Word
2. Google Docs

Transcription programs like Descript and Otter.ai also exist.

- These require an audio recording to work on (e.g. from phone, computer, hand-held recorder,...)
